## JOYCE KILMER

Excerpts By

Joyce Kilmer spent twenty years of his life on New Brunswick. His parents were Frederick Barnett Kilmer (1851-1934) and Annie Kilburn Kilmer (c.1852-1932). Dr. Frederick B. Kilmer was a chemist who joined the new Johnson and Johnson Company in 1889, manufacturers of surgical supplies established in 1886. At J & J he became head of the Scientific Department and is credited with developing the famous J & J baby powder.

The Kilmers were communicants of historic Christ Church (Episcopal), New Brunswick and Joyce Kilmer and his wife Aline Murray Kilmer were married in June of 1908 at St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Metuchen.

Joyce Kilmer first taught English and Latin at Morristown High School, NJ but subsequently went to work for Funk and Wagnalls Publishing Company and later, in 1913, the *New York Times*. There he worked on the Sunday magazine section and wrote several book reviews.

In April of 1914, Kilmer joined the 7<sup>th</sup> Regiment, New York National Guard. He enlisted in the army in August of 1917, and was with the 165<sup>th</sup> Infantry, part of the famous 43rd or "Rainbow Division." In October of 1917 he was off for service in France and promoted to the rank of sergeant in March of 1918. Kilmer was killed in action July 30, 1918 and is buried in a military cemetery at Fere-en-Tardenois, France. The French government awarded him a posthumous award of the Crois de Guerre. An editorial on Joyce Kilmer appeared in the *New York Times* of Sunday, August 25, 1918: "His was a fine career – and his country and his country's literature are not apt to forget him." Poet, essayist and author of one play, six published volumes appeared during his lifetime. "Trees" was the poem that early established his reputation. School children since the 1920s have heard, learned or sung it.

The Edison Job Corps Academy recently named the school's campus library in honor of the literary legacy of Joyce Kilmer, New Brunswick's most famous writer. The one-room library is decorated with memorabilia about Kilmer, the journalist for the *New York Times*, and World War I officer, best known for his poem "Trees." Sgt. Joyce Kilmer was born December 6, 1886 and died in an heroic attack on a German machine-gun nest at the Battle of Chateau Thierry in France. Named Alfred Joyce Kilmer, he preferred to be called Joyce Kilmer. He was educated at the Rutgers Preparatory School and Rutgers College but graduated from Columbia University, New York. His military exploits persuaded the U.S. Department of the Army to name its nearby World-War-II embarkation base in Piscataway as Camp Kilmer.

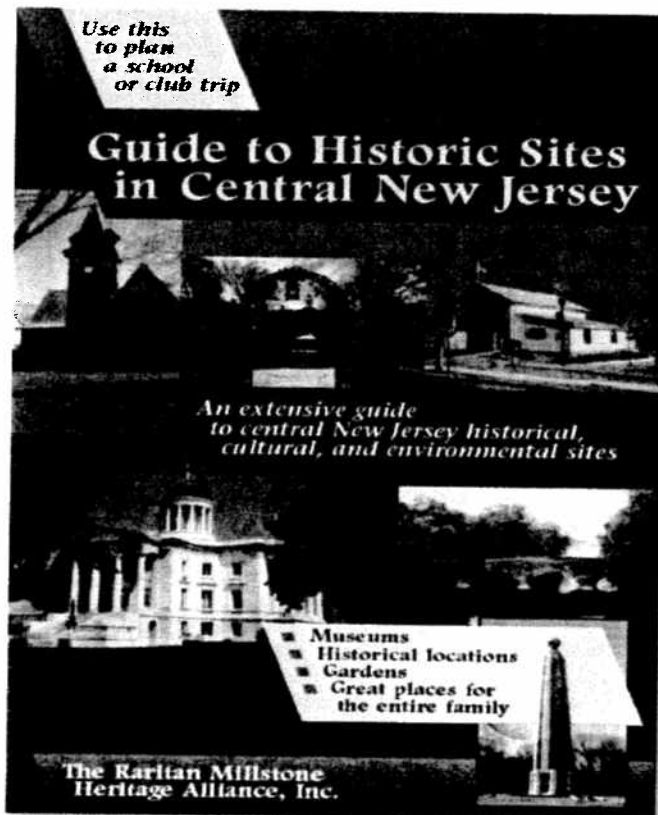

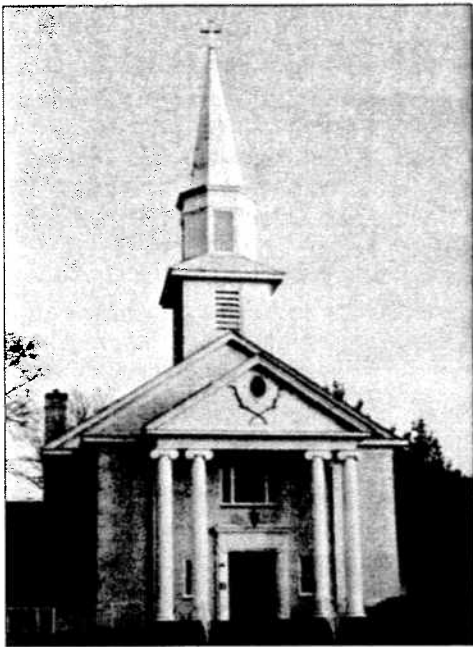

## THE PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Robert J. McEwen, Woodbridge historian and co-author of three books "Images of America – Woodbridge," died September 10, 2007. A leader of the Woodbridge Historical Association of Woodbridge Township, he was an elder of the First Presbyterian Church and Superintendent of its cemetery. He shepherded an application to place the church on the state registry of historic places.

The First Presbyterian Church (Old White Church) was established in 1669 and the first church built in 1675 on the 'Kirk green.' The Reverend Dr. Azel Roe, pastor had preached independence from the pulpit as had John Witherspoon of Princeton. A Scottish-born Presbyterian, Roe had no love for the English. He had taken part in one of the skirmishes at Blazing Star (now Carteret) and was captured by the British and imprisoned for a time at the old Sugar House in New York City.

Graves in the historic burying grounds of this church include several generations of descendants of John Pike who was among the original settlers of Woodbridge and who signed the 1666 Articles of Agreement with New Jersey's first English Governor, Philip Carteret. (Pike's descendant, General Zebulon Montgomery Pike discovered 14,110-foot high Pike's Peak in the Rocky Mountains near Colorado Springs, Colorado in 1806.)

The graves of prominent patriots of the American Revolution War include Brigadier General Nathaniel Heard who commanded the Middlesex County Militia that arrested Royal Governor William Franklin on June 19, 1776 at the Proprietary House, Perth Amboy. Other American Revolutionary War officers include Colonel Benjamin Brown, Colonel Samuel Crow, General Clarkson Edgar, Captain David Edgar, Captain Nathaniel Fitz Randolph and Lieutenant James Paten and a host of others.

### IN THE NEWS

Trenton – The historic **New Jersey Statehouse** received more than \$250,000 in repairs this summer, including work in the Senate where a chunk of plaster crashed down from the ceiling and a decorative skylight sprung a leak. Still left undone are nearly \$100 million needed repairs to the building. New Jersey's Statehouse is the second oldest Statehouse in continuous use in the nation.

Perth Amboy – **The historic Royal Governor's Mansion, the Proprietary House** is the only remaining original official royal governors residence still standing the Thirteen Colonies. It is a property of the State of New Jersey and its most significant colonial historic site. The roof of the wing of the residence of the last royal governor of New Jersey, William Franklin, son of Benjamin Franklin, is in a very tenuous condition and the entire building is in need of extensive renovation.

Piscataway – **East Jersey Olde Towne Village's** mini-exhibit, "Caught in the Crossfire: Churches, Taverns and Revolution in New Jersey" will be on display at the **The Indian Queen Tavern** through March 7, 2008.

Piscataway – the oldest publicly owned building in Middlesex County, **The Metlar-Bodine House Museum**, has a near -\$1 Million 21<sup>st</sup> century veneer restoring its appearance to vignettes of its 279 – year history prior to its near-disastrous late-evening July 17, 2003 fire. The ochre exterior now also enhances the 1839s **Livingston-Waldron Manor House** in Highland Park, the centerpiece of the Park's **Livingston Manor Historic District**.

Tottenville, Staten Island – **The Conference House**, circa 1685, (also part of the Colony of East Jersey when it was built) will celebrate its annual "**Grand Illumination**" and **Colonial Christmas Event**, Friday, December 7 and 9. For information telephone 718-984-6046.

### **THE OLD FARMER'S ALLMANAC**

The Allmanac predicts that 2008 will be the warmest year in a century. This is in sharp contrast to the winter of 1780 when more than 20 successive snowstorms blasted New Jersey's hills and slopes with six-or-seven foot snowdrifts. So intense, so prolonged was the cold of that winter that streams froze and local mills could not grind grain for Washington's ill-clad starving troops at Jockey Hollow. There, with the barest of protection from the cold, hands and feet frozen, they experienced more cruel privations by far that did those who served at Valley Forge.
